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## **Together in Charity General Assembly 2023**

In an historic first, the Sisters of Charity of New York joined the Sisters of Charity of St. Elizabeth for a joint General Assembly, in Convent Station, NJ. The six-day gathering included a full schedule of both joint and discreet sessions, daily mass, and evening social activities such as karaoke, line dancing and a special performance by the New Jersey Tenors.

It was here, in a discreet session, that the Sisters of Charity of New York voted to no longer accept new members and to begin the planning for our Congregation's path to completion (See page 3). It was also here that Sisters and Associates from both Congregations came together to identify and discuss four areas of ministry collaboration opportunities for the next four years including: Charism, Homelessness, Climate Change, and Immigration.

The joint General Assembly marked a significant moment of collaboration and unity between the two congregations. "By joining forces, we can amplify our impact and bring about meaningful change in the areas of Charism, Homelessness, Climate Change, and Immigration," said Sister Donna Dodge.

The General Assembly concluded with one of the most important moments of the week, the elections for both Congregations' Executive Councils.

For the Sisters of Charity of New York, Sister Donna Dodge was reelected as President, Sister Margaret O'Brien and Sister Mary Mc Cormick, Assistants to the President, and Sister Mary Ann Daly, Sister Sheila Brosnan and Sister Margaret Egan were elected as Councilors. The newly elected Council members expressed their gratitude for the trust placed in them and their commitment to leading the congregation through this transitional period.

Similarly, the Sisters of Charity of St. Elizabeth elected their new Executive Council; Sister Maureen Shaughnessy was elected as General Superior, Sister Cecilia McManus, Assistant General Superior, and Sister Maryanne Campeotto and Sister Ellen Farrell were elected as Councilors. The newly elected Leadership team expressed their dedication to continuing the mission and charism of the Sisters of Charity of St. Elizabeth.

## The Sisters of Charity of New York Vote on Congregation's Path to Completion

After a long and prayerful discernment process leading up to The Sisters of Charity of New York's 2023 General Assembly, delegates voted unanimously on April 13, 2023 to accept the following recommendations from our Congregation's Executive Council:

The Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul of New York will no longer work toward finding nor accepting new members to our Congregation, in the United States. However, because we believe in the future of religious life, we will continue to promote vocations, and redirect inquiries to Federation congregations and/or to the Religious Formation Conference.

The Council asks the Assembly to affirm that we, Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul of New York, continue to live our mission to the fullest, while acknowledging that we are on a path to completion.

The decision was not an easy one. Currently there are 154 Sisters of Charity of New York. We will continue to grow in love. We will continue to deepen our relationships with each other, with our Associates and with our ministry partners. We will continue to deepen our relationship with our God.

After more than 200 years of service for the Church, the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul of New York will continue to pass the torch of charity. This is not the end of our ministries. Our mission will continue beyond our Sisters, through our Associates and partners in ministry, expanding what it means to live the charism of charity into the future.

Dear Beloved Sisters,

If people aren't banging on your door to thank you, I know, like me, they are thanking you in their hearts.

I was a student at Cathedral High School and the Sisters of Charity changed my life. You changed it for the better, and those of hundreds of thousands of other students and medical patients. (Don't forget St. Vincent's Hospital, among others!) Your goodness has created a major ripple effect. Your mark on the city of New York, as well as the rest of the world, will never go away.

My home life was rough, and you extended to me an understanding and kindness that made my life all that less painful. You were my solace. But the education. The education! I am a writer, a fortunate one at that, and that's because of you. You taught me the love of the English word, and obviously, it has lasted all these years. I travel all over the world and people say to me, 'How do you know that??' I just tell them 'I had a good education.' Some of my fellow students at Cathedral and I are still in touch and say what a great education we had. You gave it to us.

But you, the Sisters of Charity, also took the word 'charity' literally and passed it on to us. That sense of giving, loving our fellow man—it was you who gave us that, and it has never left us.

I just came back this year from two 'tours of duty,' so to speak, in Ukraine, distributing food and warm clothing to refugees. What got me there? First, we had Ukrainian girls at Cathedral and the thought of them affected me when the war broke out, but it was our Senior spiritual retreat at CHS that "pushed me over the edge" and still affects me to this day.

At that retreat, a priest recounted a story about a Sister of Charity in a hospital washing an exceedingly ugly, God forgive me, even disgusting wound. The priest told her he wouldn't do that for a million dollars. Neither would she, said the good Sister, but for the love of God, yes. That story sent me to Ukraine, 54 years after I heard it.

"Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, you have done it unto me." –Matthew 25:40

You instilled this in me, and in all of us. You have fulfilled your mission, and we will never be able to thank you enough. Be proud. Elizabeth Seton is smiling on all of you. And she can't wait to meet you.

## Guatemala

ssociate Lisa Shay is the Associate Dean for Educational Innovation at Albert Nerken School of Engineering, at The Cooper Union for the Advancement of Science and Art. Since 2020, she has brought Cooper engineering students to the Barbara Ford Peacebuilding Center for summer research projects. Last summer, three students spent seven weeks living and working at the Center.

Electrical engineering major Azra Rangwala designed a photovoltaic system with battery storage to enhance one of the Center's entrepreneurship projects, which improves women's lives by teaching them to sew and providing them with sewing machines. Unfortunately, the cost of electricity in Guatemala is so high that the women spend a significant portion of their earnings just to power their sewing machines. Azra's system uses solar energy to power a sewing machine for six hours on a sunny day and store enough energy to provide power for an additional 3-6 hours on a cloudy or rainy day.

"Instead of focusing on what to do next, buy next, and always being so ready to move on, I've learned to relax. Guatemala was a good break wherein I was not rushing around NYC, trying to get the best grades possible and at the same time learn as much as I could. I was able to enjoy the nature around me at BFC and outside. Another of my favorite things about Guatemala was the beautiful green. Everywhere I went I saw

green trees, green grass, green hills—it all looked so healthy. I liked to sit in silence outside to breathe in the fresh, unpolluted air and listen to my surroundings. The Guatemalan people were all in touch with nature, which I aimed to mirror during my time there."

Mechanical engineering major Seokwoo (Ryan) Chung, developed chicken coop improvements to enhance another of the Center's entrepreneurship projects which teaches women to raise chickens for food and income. The women buy very young chicks which must be kept warm, but the cost of the electricity for the heat lamp significantly reduced their profits. Ryan designed a hot-water heating system that works with the wood stoves already in the homes. Ryan also proposed insulating coops using local materials and re-configuring them to better support the baby chicks.

"The Summer Study Program allowed me to rethink my perspective on globalization, human relation and society, and the uniqueness and beauty of foreign traditions and cultures. During this time, I was able to make connections between my culture and Guatemala's and vice versa. It not only taught me who I was and who they were, but also about what the essential characteristic of human society was.

Guatemala was a new culture that I had never experienced and that brought its relative hardships, but it taught me that humans, no matter where we are from, are human and that we can gather and move forward no matter where we are from or where we are at."

Civil engineering major Jacob Krebs developed recommendations for energy and water savings at the Center itself. He proposed changes in the on-site irrigation systems to reduce water loss and designed systems to capture rooftop rainwater that could aid in irrigation.

"As an American being welcomed into Guatemala, the most admirable thing about my host country was their culture's connection with natural and spiritual elements. Guatemala is a time capsule of decades and even centuries-old practices to an American; it reflects a society more connected with nature, spirituality, and its people than what I have experienced in the U.S." – Jacob Krebs

Si calls us to unite around our common causes. We are all called to keep hope alive in these times, despite the many disasters and tragedies we face. As one way of responding, the group pledged to gather this summer in advance of elections in Guatemala to pray for peaceful, free, and fair elections and to do so again in advance of the US elections in November.

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## **Vincent's Table**

by the Sisters of Charity of New York and the College of Mount Saint Vincent, in response to the growing needs of those who are food insecure in our surrounding communities and here on our campus.

Vincent's Table has created partnerships with Feeding Westchester and the Franciscan Friars Breadline, who together distribute nutritious food to people struggling with food insecurity.

Vincent's Table sponsors three distributions monthly: two in Yonkers, NY and one in Bronx, NY. Since its first food distribution in Yonkers in February 2022, Vincent's Table has distributed over 110,000 pounds of food to families in need. In May 2022, Vincent's Table sponsored its first distribution in the Bronx, and over the past year has distributed over 20,000 pounds of food supporting over 500 families monthly.

In addition to the monthly food distributions, Vincent's Table supports students and staff members on campus by maintaining a pantry and refrigerator where anyone is welcome to take what they need and donate what they can. Our hope is that the campus community will benefit from the generosity of those who are able to support this ministry.

Along with relying on our partnerships and donations, over the past year Vincent's Table has

received almost \$50,000 in grant funding. This has assisted us in providing services above and beyond food.

Most of us don't know what it's like to choose between buying groceries or paying our rent, but many of our neighbors struggle each day with this decision. According to a study at Johns Hopkins University, students exposed to the harsh realities of food insecurity were less likely to pursue and complete higher education. Vincent's

Table seeks to combat this increasingly common issue plaguing our modern educational system by offering any student at the College of Mount Saint Vincent a nourishing breakfast. The program has been very successful since it began one year ago.

I have had the honor of working with this ministry since its inception, and am grace-filled by its generosity and the gratitude of the people it serves. We've hosted Halloween parties for the children that come to the distributions and have given out baskets filled with treats and provided complete Thanksgiving meals to families. Through

the generosity of a donor, we have distributed over 250 children's toys at Christmas, and hosted a free legal clinic to support women who are victims of domestic violence or elder abuse.

By attending the distributions month after month, I have gotten to know some guests quite well. Learning about them and hearing about their struggles and what they have overcome is inspirational. In fact, the Sisters of Charity have provided full time employment to some of those guests. Now, although in a better position financially, the guests still come to the distributions, but not to receive donations. They volunteer and give back to their community.

Just recently at our distribution I spent time with a mother of a 4-month-old child, who was hopeful that we had bananas to offer her that week. She wanted to begin to introduce soft food to her child. She had so many questions about the baby and her habits. As a mother of three (almost) grown boys, I was happy to pass along some helpful tips that I wish I knew

as a young mother. When I saw her again, she was so excited to share the news of how her child was doing and how much she loved bananas!

Although working with this ministry is part of my role with the Sisters of Charity, I've received so much more than I ever expected. Embracing the Mission is just the start of it—living the Mission is where it's at!

## **Relics: A Special Report**

Beginning in 2015, the collections of relics possessed by the Congregation came to the attention of the Office of Special Projects. These collections originated from several sources: donations made by individuals, the closure of convents, and relics found in Sisters' belongings after their deaths. A collection was gathered from the Convent of Mary the Queen in Yonkers when it closed in 2015. When the sacristy of the Chapel of the Immaculate Conception at Mount Saint Vincent was renovated, relics were found in the safe. They had been venerated by the professed Sisters, novices, and postulants who lived at the Mount for well over a hundred years. In addition, our archivist, Mindy Gordon, made us aware that relics had been consigned to the Archives as noted in its records.

In the Catholic Church, relics are of persons officially declared saint or blessed or of a sacred object associated with Jesus Christ, such as a piece of the Holy Cross or a fragment of the Crown of Thorns. Relics of this kind are classified as first-class. A relic from the clothing (ex indumentis) of a saint or blessed is classified as second-class. A third-class relic is an object that is touched to a first-class relic.

In the tradition of the Church, saints are often honored on their feast day by displaying their relics for veneration. This provides an opportunity for a public proclamation of belief in the power of salvation through Christ, lived out in a member of the faithful now called saint or blessed. Such veneration is an avenue for the faithful to express and deepen their faith. Keeping relics stored when there is no regular community to venerate them does not fulfill this intent; therefore, finding appropriate locations for veneration of our relics became our goal.

At the outset, we acknowledge the invaluable assistance given by Sister Janet Baxendale (+March 31, 2020) to this project. Her knowledge of the documentation required to support the validity of a relic and her careful reporting on the destination of each relic came from her well-honed liturgical sense. Her connections with people developed over the years facilitated the project to its end. We also

As the project began, the first task was to separate the relics into those of each saint or sacred object. This made us realize the extent of the relics in our possession. We never counted them, but the number and variety made the task daunting, to say the least. As would be expected, relics of Elizabeth Ann Seton and Vincent de Paul outnumbered all the rest. Relics of other saints ranged from those we knew well, such as Saint Patrick and the Little Flower, to lesser-known saints.


All our relics of persons were first-class, and the relic object was a piece of the body or bone. We also had a few relics containing fragments of the Holy Cross. Usually, a relic case or theca holds the remains of one saint or blessed; we had a few cases that held relics of three to four related saints. Our most notable one was of the twelve apostles which produced a bit of interest among us. Because cases for holding relics are rather small, they are very often enclosed within a larger and, at times, ornate container called a reliquary, particularly for veneration purposes.

The second task was to match a Certificate of Authenticity with its assigned relic. The Certificate supports the truthfulness of the relic in the eyes of the Church and carries a written testimony to its validity by a person who has devoted years to the cause of the saint. A relic's validity is further supported by an intact red wax seal stamped on the backing for the relic within its case. The seal binds two crossed red threads which tie the relic

into the case; unbroken threads witness that no change has been made to the relic since its formation. In our collections, certificates were found for most relics, while the remainder had intact crossed red threads which tie the relic into the case; unbroken threads witness that no change has been made to the relic since its formation.

## The Historic Sign at Mount Saint Vincent Cemetery

he Sisters of Charity of New York's cemetery at Mount Saint Vincent has been distinguished by the installation of a 2022 New York State Historic Marker, awarded through a grant from the William G. Pomeroy Foundation. The grant program celebrates community history, to "educate the public and foster historic tourism" by acknowledging cultural sites and institutions in New York State which were founded at least 100 years prior to the grant application year. Since 2006, the Foundation has funded over 1,000 markers in the state. These iconic signs are familiar to many, by the rectangular shape and state colors in blue with yellow lettering.

The Cemetery was established in 1860 when the Community relocated from McGowan's Pass, Manhattan, due to the impending development of Central Park at the site where the Motherhouse and Chapel had been built in 1847. Several of the deceased who had been buried at McGowan's Pass were later transferred to be reburied at Mount Saint Vincent. Many of the earliest Sisters, who were teachers at the Academy of Mount Saint Vincent


and local Bronx parochial schools, child caretakers at orphanages, and nurses at hospitals during the 19th Century, were buried at the Mount. Five of the fourteen sisters who volunteered as Civil War nurses at St. Joseph's Military Hospital, located in the vacated McGowan's Pass Motherhouse and Chapel, are memorialized with government military gravestones. The Cemetery is one of 40 different locations, most in the metropolitan New York area, where Community members have been buried.

The phrasing crafted for the sign represents the ministries of these members, whose endeavors defined the traditional ministries of the Congregation. The grant application requires detailed primary resource information to generate a sign that is both representative and historically accurate. The Pomeroy Foundation's guidelines allow six lines of text, with an allowance for a certain number of spaces for each line. The Foundation's grant administrators work diligently with each applicant to ensure compliance.

The Mount Saint Vincent sign has been placed at the base of the sidewalk leading to the cemetery on the hill, so that it may be visible to the campus community. A formal installation ceremony will take place at a later date. The Community is elated to be able to share this legacy through the gift of this grant from the William G. Pomeroy Foundation.

Sr. Ellen Ouirke

Sister Ellen entered the Sisters of Charity of New York on September 8, 1945. She obtained a BS in Education from Fordham University, an MA in Pastoral Counseling from Iona College, and an MSW in Social Work from Fordham University. With 49 years of active ministry, Sister Ellen began her journey in elementary education, teaching and serving as Principal at various schools in the Bronx and

Manhattan. In 1964, she became the Director of the Juniorate at Mount Saint Vincent. From 1969 onwards, Sister Ellen dedicated 27 years to social work, working at different institutions in Yonkers and Manhattan. For 18 years, she ministered in lower New York neighborhoods through Saint Vincent Hospital and Medical Center, providing community medicine and visiting home care. Sister Ellen found her service to be a mutual healing experience. She retired in 1996, resided at Mount Saint Vincent Convent and Kittay Senior Apartments, and passed away on July 9, 2022, at the age of 95, in her 77th year as a Sister of Charity of New York.



Sr. Mary Adele Henze

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Sister Mary Adele joined the Sisters of Charity of New York on September 8, 1951. Throughout her 51 years of active ministry, she dedicated herself to education. She taught at various elementary schools, including Saint Paul in Brooklyn, Saint Ignatius Loyola in Manhattan, Saint John the Evangelist in White Plains, and served as Principal at Holy Trinity in Mamaroneck. Sister Mary Adele also worked as a guidance counselor for

elementary grades at schools in the Bronx and for Saint Gabriel High School in New Rochelle. Later, she directed the Religious Education Program at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Scarsdale for 16 years. Sister Mary Adele recognized needs and provided assistance throughout her life, from supporting teachers and students as a guidance counselor to volunteering at the New Rochelle Outreach Center and offering help to fellow Sisters in retirement. Sister Mary Adele died on July 17, 2022, at the age of 91, in her 72nd year of commitment as a Sister of Charity of New York.



Sr. Kathleen Tracy

Sister Kathleen joined the Sisters of Charity of New York in 1950. She obtained an MS and PhD in biology from Fordham University in 1955 and went on to teach biology at various institutions, including St. John the Evangelist High School, Fordham University, and the College of Mount Saint Vincent. She pursued postdoctoral studies in radiation biology at the University of Chicago and the University

of Oak Ridge. Throughout her sixty years of ministry, Sister Kathleen dedicated herself to the College of Mount Saint Vincent, serving as Associate Professor, Professor, and Chair of the Biology Department. She established the Institute for Aquatic Research, introduced the first bioethics course on the undergraduate level, and proposed new courses that enriched the science curriculum. After her tenure in the Biology Department, Sister Kathleen held administrative roles and served as Associate Vice-President for Advancement, including twenty years as the director of the Mount's cooperative program with Manhattan College. Even after retirement, Sister Kathleen continued to contribute voluntary service to the institution with which her name is forever associated. Sr. Kathleen Tracy died on July 21, 2022, at the age of 96, in her 72nd year of commitment as a Sister of Charity of New York.



Sr. Marie Paula Holdman

Sister Paula dedicated sixty-five years to education, teaching at the Academy of Mount Saint Vincent in the Bronx, Cathedral High School in Manhattan, and the College of Mount Saint Vincent for forty-eight years. At the college, she held various positions, including Associate Professor of English and German, Chair of the German Department, moderator of college publications, and College Historian. Sister Paula also served as the

Director of Communications and Editor for the Congregation's publications, including Le Gras Bulletin and VISION magazine. She actively participated in a History Writing Project, presenting papers on the role of women religious and the Sisters of Charity in higher education. Sister Paula considered the College of Mount Saint Vincent a spiritual and intellectual center in a changing educational landscape. She retired in 2007 and continued to volunteer at the college until her passing on September 18, 2022, at the age of 101, in her 81st year as a Sister of Charity of New York.



Sr. Patricia Walsh

Sister Patricia's fifty-five years of active ministry encompassed diverse fields of service. She spent twenty years as an elementary school teacher at various locations, including Saint Raymond in the Bronx, Saint John the Evangelist in White Plains, and Incarnation and Saint Bernard in Manhattan. Sister Patricia also served as the Principal of Saint Gabriel Elementary in the Bronx for eight years.

Her administrative skills were utilized in caring for young children and their families at Queens Daughters Day Care Center in Yonkers, as well as for senior Sisters of the Congregation at Convent of Mary the Queen in Yonkers and Mount Saint Vincent Convent in the Bronx. Additionally, she worked as a Patient Representative at Saint Joseph's Medical Center in Yonkers and later served as a Receptionist at the Sisters of Charity Center before her retirement in 2014. Sister Patricia resided at Mount Saint Vincent Convent and then moved to Kittay Senior Apartments before passing away on February 12, 2023, at the age of 84, in her 67th year as a Sister of Charity of New York.



Sr. Patricia Noone

Sister Patricia dedicated forty-nine of her fifty-five years of active ministry to teaching English at the College of Mount Saint Vincent in the Bronx. She joined the college's English Department in 1964 and held various roles, from Instructor to Chair to Professor of English. Sister Patricia played a significant role in the growth of the department, introducing courses like women's studies. In 1977, she authored

the acclaimed book *Mary for Today*. After leaving the college in 2013, she was asked by the Congregation to chair a committee to write the history of the Sisters of Charity of New York from 1996 to 2020, completing the three-volume history project started by Sister Marie de Lourdes Walsh and Sister Mary Elizabeth Earley. Sister Patricia also contributed to streamlining communications for the Congregation and external audiences through publications like FOCUS and VISION magazine. Sr. Patricia died on February 26, 2023, at the age of 83, in her 62nd year of commitment as a Sister of Charity of New York.



Sr. Miriam Anne Brennan

Sister Miriam Anne began her mission in elementary education for five years before dedicating sixty-four years to the nursing ministry. She served at various hospitals, starting at Saint Vincent's Hospital in New York, where she worked as a nurse, Department Chair in Obstetrics, and Assistant Director of Nursing for over a decade. She then became the Director of

Nursing and the first Director of the School of Nursing at Saint Vincent's Hospital in Staten Island. Sister Miriam Anne also held roles as the Health Coordinator for the Sisters of Charity and worked in nursing administration at Saint Joseph's Hospital in Yonkers. For thirty years, she served the health needs of the Congregation in different capacities. In 2009, she retired from full-time ministry and passed away on March 17, 2023, at the age of 102, in her 85th year as a Sister of Charity.



Sr. Constance Kelly

Sister Constance devoted fifty-two years to education and pastoral ministry. She taught for thirteen years at schools in Brooklyn and the Bronx, including Saint Charles Borromeo and Saint Margaret of Cortona. Later, she taught Latin at Saint Raymond Academy for Girls. In 1971, she began thirty-seven years of pastoral work in Santiago, Chile, followed by fourteen years in Guatemala. Upon

returning to New York, she continued her ministry with the Hispanic community at Saint Peter of Alcantara Church in Port Washington. Sister Constance's dedication was recognized when she was honored as a Woman of Distinction in Port Washington. After retiring in 2010, she resided at Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Manhattan until her passing on June 10, 2023, at the age of 85, after serving as a Sister of Charity of New York for 68 years.



Sr. Jean Bocian

Sister Jean's active ministry spanned fifty-eight years, with twenty-seven years spent in elementary classrooms and twenty-five years dedicated to serving immigrant families. She taught at various schools in the Bronx, Manhattan, Yonkers, and Pelham Manor, while also engaging in innovative programs. In 1987, she received a Christa McAuliffe Fellowship from the US Department of Education

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to establish an after-school program called S.K.I.P, focusing on improving reading and math skills for students in Yonkers. Sister Jean's commitment extended to co-directing the Sisters of Charity Multi-Service Center, Casa de Esperanza, which provided support to immigrant families in Yonkers, including citizenship preparation, English as a Second Language classes, and employment skills training. Sister Jean's dedication to marginalized communities led her to create practical solutions and build networks of support. She passed away on March 20, 2023, at Calvary Hospital in the Bronx, at the age of 75, in her 58th year of commitment as a Sister of Charity of New York.


